


River Herring



- Found in rivers, coastal waters
- Anadromous
- Economically and ecologically significant
- Important to the food web
 - striped bass, cod, blue fin tuna, osprey, bald eagles, heron


Atlantic Coast River Herring Landings

Estimated Yearly Herring Run Size 2012 - 2016









Fish Passage







- Schools:
 - 30 teachers engaged from 6 school districts
 - 440 students involved in 2017
- Compare with other fish counts across State and New England
- Inform planning and management of this critical species
